2026 Nominations



Bylaws Article 3, Section 2: The nominating committee shall nominate not more than eight (8) nor fewer than three (3) candidates for the office of member of the Vestry. The nominating committee shall also nominate at least three (3) candidates for the office of lay deputy and at least two (2) candidates for the office of alternate deputy to represent the parish in the Diocesan Convention and shall nominate candidates for the office of lay representative to the Deanery in conformance with deanery requirements. The names of those nominated shall be published at least two (2) weeks before the election. Additional nominations may be made by members entitled to vote if filed with the Accounting Warden at least one week before the election.

The Nominating Committee is pleased to nominate the following members for election to the offices of leadership and representation in the following areas:

Vestry

Parish Bylaws, Article 4, Section 1. Those qualified to serve on the Vestry shall be baptized lay persons of at least the age of eighteen (18) years, and members of the Corporation, a majority of whom shall be residents of Pennsylvania, and who shall have been nominated in writing to the Secretary before the time fixed for election as provided in Section 2 of Article 3.

Article 4, Section 2. There shall be no fewer than three (3) and no more than four (4) members of the Vestry elected annually for a three (3) year term, and they shall be ineligible for re-election for one (1) year after their term has expired.

Youth Delegate

Article 4 Section 4. There may be a Youth Representative to the Vestry elected annually for a one-year term who will be eligible for re-election for an additional one-year term. The Representative shall be a baptized lay person of at least thirteen (13) years who shall have been nominated in writing to the Secretary before the time fixed for election, as provided in Section 2 of Article 3. The Youth Representative shall have a seat and voice on the Vestry.

From the Rector's Warden

The Vestry is the elected leadership body of the parish, meeting monthly to oversee the business of the church, including personnel, finances, property management and maintenance. Vestry members liaise with parish ministries, committees and staff.

This year the Vestry has been hard at work improving the processes and procedures St. Peter's uses to manage our resources. A new Financial Subcommittee of the Vestry - including our Accounting Warden and Finance Chair - has helped to sharpen the financial reports the Vestry uses monthly to track spending, monitor savings, and respond responsibly when emergency expenses arise. Vestry members are leading a new Capital Improvement Projects Planning Group working with our Property Chair to help St. Peter's be better prepared for short-term and long-term needs for maintenance and improvement. Vestry members also oversee the Steeple Committee working through the complexities of getting our steeple replaced after a lightning strike. Currently we're in the midst of transitioning our budgeting process to be more proactive and mission-driven and working with our ministry leaders to help us navigate these changes.

Property Committee

Every day, Tim, our caretaker, and Joe, our cleaner, ensure that our buildings are comfortable, clean and welcoming to everyone who comes here. From the children at Kid View, to parish members who gather to worship, work, and socialize, to community members attending meetings, seeking assistance from our Food Cupboard and Community Fridge, or simply looking for a warm and quiet place—everyone benefits from their efforts. Outside, our dedicated group of gardeners, Debbie Panebianco, Amy Neske and Eileen Dooley, plant flowers, pull weeds, trim, and keep the Memorial Garden and outdoor areas fresh and attractive. Without their hard work and commitment, it would be difficult to make St. Peter's

an appealing and well-functioning resource for our congregation and the entire community.

We maintain and improve a cluster of buildings that are over seventy-five years old. Two years ago, we resolved a major heating problem and installed an efficient, modern system for our church. However, many tasks remain: exterior painting, roof repairs, modifications, kitchen updates, pew repairs, window replacements, and more, all requiring attention. The vestry has instructed us to develop a list of major renovations and repairs needed, then set priorities. Mark Evans, the property liaison, leads a committee to address and prioritize these issues. Mark will also host another property forum, focused on the sanctuary, to generate ideas for making it fully accessible and usable for various future activities.

If you have any thoughts or concerns about how we use the sanctuary, let Mark know so you can be informed about the upcoming forum. If you are handy with tools and have some spare time to help with small projects, please reach out—we always appreciate the help.

One final note: the veneer on our seventy-five-year-old ends of the pews is deteriorating, and we need a solution to restore their beauty. If you have woodworking skills or ideas, please contact me.

Worship

Worship at St. Peter's in 2025 saw participation of our members, as well new direction for both our choir and our folk group and additional liturgical ministers.

Sacraments

In Spring of 2025 two adults from St. Peter's were received into the Episcopal Church at the Easter Vigil. In the fall of 2025, we started a confirmation class of eight youth, who will be confirmed in spring of 2026.

There were no baptisms in 2025.

Liturgical ministers

Music director and organist Carol Cei resigned from the position in June of 2025. A search committee was formed and met throughout the summer. In August Sam Faust (they/them) was hired as our new music director and organist. They started in October of 2025. Sam brings a love of music written by women composers, and a strong commitment to representing the work of people from marginalized groups.

In 2025, Linda Toia, who founded the Folk Group in 2002, moved to Baltimore to be with family. For more than 20 years, Linda directed the group, planned the music, and ran rehearsals. Throughout the year before her departure, she worked to develop the leadership of the group in her absence. Four members of the Folk Group stepped up to serve as a leadership team: Kristina Marchuk, Terita Reeve, Donna Kulp, and Debbie DeKalb. Among them, they plan and manage the music, run rehearsals, and direct the group when they play. The Folk Group leads the music at liturgy six times a year.

The Rev. Bob Smith, who served his diaconal internship at St. Peters in 2024 and was ordained February of 2025, was assigned to St Peter's staff as our deacon. Deacon Bob oversees requests for support from community members and works with our outreach ministries. He is also a member of our pastoral care team. On Sundays he proclaims the Gospel and oversees the ministry of the table, tasks reserved for deacons.

Rosalinda Ibañez Memba continues to progress as a postulant for the priesthood. Postulancy is an initial time of

preparation and testing for ordained ministry.

Additional acolytes and Eucharistic Ministers were trained this year. We could always use more help in these areas, as well as ushers.

Special Liturgical Programs

In January of 2025 St Peter's hosted the Souls Shot Exhibition, featuring paintings by local artists honoring the lives of people who died from gun violence in the region over the previous year. The portraits hung in the church and were remembered in our liturgies. A special program to meet the artists and organizers of the Souls Shot program was held, as well as a special Taizé prayer service. Souls Shots tours throughout the region and the state.

In addition, our Taizé team offered a Blue Christmas service for people suffering grief or loss during the Advent and Christmas season. And they offered a Lenten service as well. These quiet contemplative evenings, marked with chants, silence and candlelight are unique offerings that draw people from the community as well as our parish.

Attendance

Our average Sunday attendance is about where it was in 2024, averaging about 90 people on a Sunday.

As always, my gratitude goes out to all who serve in liturgical ministry at St Peter's: Our Altar Guild, acolytes, lectors, choir and folk group, tech team, and ushers, as well as the wonderful volunteers who ensure that our fellowship time is filled with good food to share.

Ministry Scheduler Report

Scheduling Tool

Our parish utilizes the app Ministry Scheduler Pro to efficiently manage and coordinate our liturgical worship minister schedule. This tool has been instrumental in organizing and supporting our volunteer ministries.

Liturgical Schedule

An eight-week schedule is built within the app to cover the following ministries:

- **Acolytes**
- **Eucharistic Ministers**
- **Ushers**
- **Lectors**
- **Intercessors**
- **Counters**
- **Vestry Steward**

Approximately 60 volunteers actively serve within these ministries, contributing to the spiritual life and smooth functioning of our worship services.

Features and Functionality

Ministry Scheduler Pro offers several features that enhance the scheduling process:

- **Schedule Changes:** The ability to make adjustments as needed.
- **Sub Requests:** Volunteers can request substitutes directly through the app, streamlining communication.
- **Email Communication:** The app supports sending group emails or individual notifications to volunteers.
- **Login Management:** Providing volunteers with login information to access their schedules and updates.

Volunteer Engagement

This tool has allowed for greater flexibility and responsiveness, ensuring that our ministries are staffed effectively while supporting the volunteers who dedicate their time to these roles.

Godly Play for Everyone

Godly Play Foundation Mission Statement: Making meaning through story, wonder, and play. Nurturing spiritual lives by honoring the centrality, competency, and capacity of children.

Godly play is a Montessori-based approach to spiritual formation and is one of the ways we nurture children's spiritual lives by offering space to experience God's love, wonder, and presence in community here at St. Peter's. Used in 70 countries worldwide, Godly Play is recognized as a trusted method for helping children explore their faith with imagination and wonder. Godly play affirms that children are already in relationship with God. Through storytelling, sacred play and guided wondering, children engage deeply with the core stories of scripture and the practices of our liturgical tradition. This process helps them learn to speak the language of our Christian faith in a way that is both personal and authentic.

St Peter's has a long and meaningful history with Godly Play. It takes place during the first part of the Sunday worship service and children rejoin their families at Communion. It is designed for children ages 3 through 5th grade. This past year we saw our Godly Play circle grow to include about 25 children overall, with an average Sunday attendance of 5 on any given Sunday during the course of the year. Maureen Schaeffer and Rosalinda Ibañez-Memba have been faithful co-teachers in this ministry, and their partnership is much appreciated. I am looking forward to Keirstin Sibley joining the team in the new year.

I realized this year that I have been the storyteller for this ministry for 37 years and have loved every minute of it. But a lot is changing in my life at this time, and I told Rev. Barb in September that I will be retiring from this ministry at the end of this program year. New storytellers will need to be raised up and trained in time for September 2026. I wonder if the Holy Spirit is calling you, perhaps? Please speak with me or Rev. Barb if you are interested. It has been a fulfilling and spirit-filled ministry for me.

Youth and Teens

Listening Circle: A Small Group Opportunity

Beginning in the fall of 2010 with one group, and adding a second group in 2013, Listening Circles at St. Peter's have met monthly through the program year to experience and practice deep listening. Our time together is shaped by the Circle of Trust Touchstones developed by the Center for Courage & Renewal, in hopes of building trust and creating a safe place for listening and sharing. Participants take time to share some of our personal stories with each other and use poems and stories to help guide our conversations as we explore questions that arise about life. We turn to wonder and try to let go of judgment. Our work is not about fixing or saving or advising in these circles, but instead to listen deeply, reflect in silence, and explore what might be stirring in us.

With Linda Toia's desire to continue co-leading after her move to Baltimore this past summer, the two groups addressed the question of how to go forward. Listening Circle One decided to continue its hybrid schedule for another year together—meeting in the library for fall and spring months, and by Zoom during winter months. Listening Circle Two decided to continue meeting by Zoom, as this group has done since Covid.

Over the years of Listening Circles, participants have shared with us ways in which relationships with others in their work, family, church, or organizations have been transformed through the practice of listening carefully to others. This “circle” of intentional, trusting, listening continues to grow at St. Peter's. Listening Circles are open to anyone interested in deeper listening and strengthening relationships. Their size is limited to provide more generous time for each person's participation. Due to the importance of building trust, participants are encouraged to attend as many of the sessions as possible. Please contact Linda or Melissa if you are interested in learning more about this opportunity.

We look forward to living into whatever may unfold as we continue this good and holy practice of listening to one another.

Daniel Memorial Library and The Archives

As many of you enter the church from the parking lot every Sunday, the Library sits just waiting for you inside the entry. Books are arranged based on a classification Code used by churches. Books are arranged by this code and, within the code, by the author's last name. A copy of this classification is inside the green binder as well as on shelf labels that show where a new classification begins and what it means. The binder also holds alphabetical listings of the books by author's name, by title, and by subject.

An explanation of pictures and hangings in the room can be found in a clear plastic holder on the back of the

double entry doors. Read it as your eyes travel around the room. As the world changes, our minds may still look for the stimulation of holding a book, turning the pages, and feeling connected to someone else in a unique way. Please come in, sit down, and enjoy. All books, other than reference books, bibles, and service books such as hymnals and prayer books, can be taken home. Use the clipboard to let us know if you have borrowed something. Just return it to the table or one of the open shelves when done.

Besides books, the Library has become the repository of our archives, the accumulation of our records dating back to 1873. Although much of our history was saved, it was not always accessible. In the Library around the walls, you will find black shelves with binders. The binders are labeled. The History of St. Philip-in-the-Fields can be found on the shelf at the back of the room. On the picture wall are binders with some of our more recent Vestry Minutes. On your left as you enter are shelves with documents, pictures, etc. saved from our past. Also, there are binders with sermons from a few of our Rectors as well as the Minutes of the Annual Meetings. We have also compiled a small binder with full page pictures of the ministers of both churches in the order of their first year with their respective churches.

In addition, the pictures on the walls of the library show St. Peter's and St. Philip's beginnings, and end with a picture of how we are today, one church, one congregation.

Personally, I want to thank those people who helped with the recent acquisition of books from Linda Toia: Helen Collins, Debbie DeKalb, and Karen Sayer. Due to the number of books added, the memorabilia has been placed in storage in the closet. I have enjoyed taking care of our books but find that I can no longer continue. Hopefully, the next guardian of the library space will step forward as I did many years ago. Please enjoy the gifts we have been given.

Parish Nurse Report

This year has been a time of growth and renewal for our parish health ministries, with a focus on education, accessibility, and holistic care for all members of our community.

Highlights of 2025:

- **Revision of Pastoral Care Team Documents:**

The Pastoral Care Team's short-term small group materials were reviewed and updated to better support volunteers and ensure consistent, compassionate care for parish members in times of need.

- **Menstrual Care Items Ministry:**

A new ministry was launched to provide menstrual care items in all parish restrooms. All restrooms are now clearly labeled as all-gender, supporting dignity and inclusivity for everyone in our community.

- **Updated Intimate Partner Violence Resources:**

The previous "Domestic Abuse" posters were revised and replaced with updated Intimate Partner Violence Resources, which now appear in all restrooms. This update reflects a broader understanding of relationship violence and directs individuals to current, supportive resources.

- **Back Door Reading Posters:**

A new monthly series of "Back Door Reading" posters was introduced. These feature educational and seasonal health messages tied to scripture and include a short parish nurse note. Topics have ranged from safety reminders to wellness encouragements, and the response from parishioners has been overwhelmingly positive.

Looking Ahead to Late 2026:

- Brown Bag Medication Check: An opportunity for parishioners to review medications with a healthcare professional for safety and understanding.
- Health Screenings: Upcoming blood pressure and blood sugar screenings will promote awareness and preventive care.
- Healing Retreat (March):

Planning is underway for a healing and wellness retreat this March, focusing on the healing and spiritual power of health and faith.

As we move forward, the Parish Nurse Ministry remains committed to promoting wellness of body, mind, and spirit—supporting our parish family in living out our faith through caring for one another.

During our meetings we reviewed and customized the materials and templates provided by The Episcopal Network for Stewardship (tens.org), and brainstormed ways of fostering Stewardship for St. Peters not just during pledge season, but year-round.

The 2025 pledge season kicked off on Sunday, October 12th. Each Sunday there were personal presentations from our members on some of the volunteer ministries that keep St. Peter’s running. There were also reflection pages available each week relating each Sunday’s readings to Stewardship. This year we introduced Stewardship Meals, opportunities to connect with each other in small groups over a meal. The Stewardship Team is deeply grateful to those members of St. Peter’s who opened their homes for these dinners. Ingathering Sunday this year was November 16. By the end of December 2025 we had received 60 pledges, totaling \$173,859.

While November will continue to be ‘pledge season’, the Stewardship team will work throughout the coming year to keep Stewardship as an ongoing focus, so as a community we can reflect on how our treasure, time and talent may be used to build up and expand our parish and the larger community that we serve.

Outreach

Community Partnership Team

Our name is Community Partnerships because we partner with our community. Currently, we try to limit our community within the Diocese of Pennsylvania.

Our funding comes primarily from two sources—half of the proceeds from the biannual rummage sales and year-round random online rummage sales, and 10% of bequests left to the church without a designated donation site.

To qualify for a grant from our committee, organizations must submit the following:

- its current operating budget.
- latest audited financial statement.
- a list of current board members with contact information.
- contact person’s name and contact information.
- information about its mission, service area, population, and accomplishments

This is a total of 16 organizations which received help from St. Peters. These grants total \$12,250, including October.

Besides giving out grants this committee also collects items to share in the community.

LAYETTE SUNDAY:

Mother's Day finds us collecting items for newborns and toddlers. These can be new or slightly used and consist of clothes, diapers, or other items young ones need.

BACKPACKS AND SCHOOL SUPPLIES

In August we collect backpacks and school supplies for needy children who would not have supplies to start school without our help. These consist of notebooks, binders, paper folders, notebook paper, backpacks, and other supplies students need.

UNITED THANK OFFERING

October finds talk about gratitude, giving thanks, and showing thanks.

You should have a UTO blue box to save your change in. Remember every penny counts and every penny donated goes to the grants. New blue boxes will be passed out the first part of the year. Be sure to get yours.

SEAMEN'S CHURCH INSTITUTE

November finds us thinking about the people who bring our goods into the ports. About 5% of seafarers are female, and close to 90% of the workers are from the Philippines. They are usually at sea for 6 months or longer, and when the ship does pull into port, only a few workers are allowed to get off. We collect personal items, writing tablets, envelopes, chap sticks, work socks, work gloves, hats, and scarves. It is asked that the work items be in dark colors. We package similar items together, counting the number of each item. Then these are taken to the Seamen's Church Institute at the port.

This year St. Peter's congregation gave 63 fleece and 3 knitted scarves, 34 hats, 11 pairs of gloves, 57 pairs of

socks, 5 bottles of body wash and 25 bars of soap, 11 tubes of toothpaste, 7 toothbrushes, 21 deodorants, and couple packages of disposable razors. There were 35 tubes of hand lotion, some hard candy, fingernail clippers, writing paper, stamps, pens, and chap sticks.

Then both gifts go into a large gift bag with maybe some candy. These gifts are given to the children during the celebration of the Three Kings. Last year, we served almost 70 children. The children must earn the right to receive the gifts by attending church services and school. Some of the children belong to Corinth 13 Center.

Since 2003 St. Peter's Church has maintained a very special relationship with five small congregations in the Northeast area of Guatemala. St. Peter's members who have visited our beloved companions have found these pilgrimages to be inspiring and life-changing adventures.

In addition to visits and communication through WhatsApp, Zoom, and email, the companion relationship involves the following aspects:

- Scholarship Program in which children receive partial scholarships making it possible for their families to keep them in school. Some of our earlier scholarship recipients are now in post high school education programs!

You are invited to make contributions to the Guatemala Scholarship Fund for the upcoming year.

- Medical Emergency Fund provided to the clergy in our companion parishes to use at their discretion to help parishioners who have no medical insurance and serious medical needs.
- Water Filtration Project to help provide safe drinking water to families.
- Regular prayer for one another. We also keep each other informed and commit to praying for each other during particularly difficult times.

Some highlights of 2025 were the following:

- Guatemala Sunday was celebrated on Dec. 7 with music by the folk group, a recorded sermon by our friend Rev. Neli Miranda with music recorded by her son Maximo, special food for fellowship hour and a very successful Guatemala sale with crafts from UPAVIM, a women's cooperative in Guatemala City.
- In November we sent money for scholarships and medical emergencies to our companion churches.

Our Guatemala Committee meets on Zoom periodically and would welcome interested members. Red Cross Blood Drive

For this drive, there were 68 appointments made, of which 40 people actually showed up (ten people were 1st time donors). This allowed the Red Cross to collect 55 pints of blood, thus aiding 165 patients in the Delaware Valley area.

Vaccine Clinic

After having run small vaccine clinics in conjunction with Eric's Rx Shop in 2023 and 2024, we took a bold step in 2025. This time we partnered with Montgomery County after learning that they had lost their clinic site in the eastern end of the county, requiring folks to travel further to access care. Since the county provides many shots for the un/underinsured this access is critical. Our location on a public bus route is also very helpful. So, whereas our previous clinics served 30 to 50 people (mostly with private insurance) this time we were able to provide care for more neighbors with a wider diversity. We had 180 people register for the event, and 151 people received a total of 255 vaccines (126 influenza and 129 Covid-19). Thank you to the parish and the community groups who relocated so that we could use the entire auditorium space for this event.

Gun Violence Awareness & Advocacy

In 2025, St. Peter's remained deeply committed to honoring lives lost to gun violence and advocating for meaningful change. Throughout the month of January, we hosted The Souls Shot art exhibition in the sanctuary, featuring portraits of Philadelphia-area residents whose lives were taken by gun violence. Created by local artists using diverse media, the exhibition transformed our sacred space into a place of remembrance, lament, and advocacy for effective gun safety legislation.

In April, Parishioners Mary Rivera, Maureen Schaeffer, and Alex Stevers-Radke furthered this work by joining fellow advocates at Pennsylvania's End Gun Violence Advocacy Day at the State Capitol in Harrisburg, where they spoke directly with legislators.

Our work continued with the annual Toll the Bells for Gun Violence Awareness Day, as Rev. Barb and Bell Choir Director Kathy Flaherty participated in the city-wide ringing of bells as a prayerful cry for peace.
